STEAM Day Camp Scholarship Opportunity

Our 4-H Club has focused on STEAM projects the last few years, and a graduating senior held a Facebook fundraiser to encourage other counties to copy one of our favorite projects – a STEAM Day Camp! "As a Georgia 4-H senior I want to create a

scholarship opportunity that will be long lasting and have a residual impact to future 4-H'ers in need," said Lavendar Harris, 12th grade 4-H member from Newton County.

With the growing popularity of STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art & Math) based programs, Lavendar and CJ Harris created three STEAM Camp curricula which they implemented during week-long day camps for the past three summers in Newton County. The camp has had a huge impact on the kids by giving them a chance to be hands on, learn about science, use the engineering process, and establish connections with their teams. The camp has also been a great opportunity for Teen Leaders to learn about leadership, teamwork, and instructing skills.

To expand their project, they have decided to establish the Lavendar & CJ Harris STEAM Day Camp Scholarship. This \$250 scholarship will not only include the full camp curriculum but will also help to offset the funds towards the camp. Agents will be free to use the funds for whatever STEAM-related activities of their choosing, such as purchasing materials, kits, or individual scholarships for campers. The curriculum can be used as a week long day-camp, or split into different "STEAM-Days" of the county's choosing.

The camp is hands on, engaging, and runs heavily on Teen Leaders! If your county is interested in

this scholarship, all you would need to do is fill out a simple application!

Money-Making Apps ... AKA Adult Consumer Judging

Receipt Pal

Receipt Pal is an "income generating" app in that you earn points for your receipts that you can cash in for gift cards to Amazon, E-Gift Card (for lots of retailers), Restaurant.com, and others

What do you do? Use your smart phone to take photos of your receipts. Each receipt fills a space on a card. Each card has 4 spaces.

What do you earn? 100 points per card.

What is the payout? Payout varies. For 400 points you can get a \$1 Amazon card—hold out until you have 14000 points and you can get a \$50 amazon card (280 points/\$1). Restaurant.com is a much lower redemption with \$50 for 3500 points (70 points/\$1).

What I like about Receipt Pal? It's easy. I either do receipts as I get them or one evening during the week, I do all my receipts. It's a quick photo and go. I don't have to think about what I'm buying or where to go to get the deal. And you do have a record of your receipt.

What is the downside of Receipt Pal? It's not a huge payout as in it takes some time to earn the points. You will only get a few cards each week. Sometimes it takes a few days to process so if a receipt is rejected you'll need to replace it on the card to fill the card.

Tips for Quicker Earnings

- Load every week and fill your cards before Sunday morning. On Sunday morning you get new cards based on your filled cards. If you have 3 ½ filled, you only get 3 new cards for the week and you missed the chance at that 4th card.
- Receipts expire the Tuesday after that week. So Sunday is the 1st, your receipts for the 1st-7th will expire on the 9th.
- Take good photos. If anything is missing or blurred they will reject the receipt

All and all, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 is don't bother and 5 is loving it, I give it a 3 ½. To me, it's passive and easy. It won't make you rich but it will give you a little extra and if you're better than me at taking your photos, you can cash in easily!

Panel App

Panel App is an "income generating" app in that you earn points by taking surveys based on where you've been and what you buy. To join, click the link: https://www.placed.com/panel/panels/711b0c40f1da/signup?rid=8e61545a4d87

What do you do? Initially, you do nothing but add the app to the phone. You will periodically get requests for surveys – look for the message icon on the app to appear - and complete the survey based on where you have been and what you have done.

What do you earn? Points towards gifts cards and sweepstakes.

What is the payout? Payout is generally for Amazon, Walmart, and Visa gift cards. Payout begins at 1,000 points for \$1 and goes up to 20,000 points for \$25. It pays to keep earning before cashing out. Sweepstakes are much lower. For example, you can use 5 points to enter for a \$5 gift card drawing.

What I like about Panel App? It's one of the easiest apps there is. Until I have a survey, I do nothing. I earn points from where I've been (no idea how these work ... they just appear), for surveys, from locations, and from referrals.

What is the downside of Panel App? It's not a huge payout as in it takes some time to earn the points. If you're not paying attention, you'll lose the opportunity to complete the survey.

Tips for Quicker Earnings

- Refer friends. You have the potential to earn 10% of your friends' points at no cost to them
- Watch your app for surveys & complete them. I feel like the more surveys I do, the more surveys I get

All and all, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 is don't bother and 5 is loving it, I give it a 4. To me, it's passive and easy. I do surveys waiting in line or binge watching something on TV, so really it's mindless.

Shopkicks

Shopkicks is an rewards app in that you earn points by walking in stores, scanning items, and purchasing items. If you try Shopkicks with my code CARD938497 or download http://getsk.co/card938497 we both will get points in our account.

What do you do? Turn on the app. Walk in stores for walk in points, scan items in the store (as requested), scan receipts of items you bought, or earn points through linked credit cards. You can earn points for all three of these activities and you don't have to do them all to get points, so you could just get the walk in points, if you like.

What do you earn? You earn points for different activities (walk in, scan, receipts, linked cards, referrals). Points vary with stores and days.

What is the payout? 250 points is the equivalent to \$1. There are \$2,\$5, \$10, \$25 increments for lots of different gift cards.

What I like about Shopkicks? Points are points. You don't have to let the rack up to earn them and the payout is quick. I often check out my Shopkicks balance as I walk in Target and do the request for the gift card then. It may only be \$5 but it's ready to go at check out as an e-gift card right on my phone. There are also a lot of different ways to earn. You can go basic and just get the easy walk in kicks or work at it and plan your shopping around the extra points for scanning and purchasing items. I also love the app itself. I open it up and can see on the screen what stores near me at that moment have kicks and whether they are walk in, scan, receipts, or \$/linked card. There is also a highlight bar with specials. You can also save items you like and there are shopping "catalogs" you can browse for shops with kicks.

What is the downside of Shopkicks?

If you get into scanning, it can take some time. Items listed for scan are not always in the store. The credit is not always that great unless you were planning to purchase the item (scanned receipt).

Tips for Quicker Earnings

- Always check Shopkicks. Look for stores near you with walk-in points. Sometimes you can get those points for walking nearby and not actually going in the store. Mall and outlets malls are great for this!
- If I'm in a store with scan points, I aim for 100+ points per visit. I look at what I need and where I'll be in the store and try to scan those items.
- Tap the Discover book at the bottom of the app. This is primarily ads for specials but nearly every day there are a few kicks available for watching videos about products.
- Don't forget to click the online tap and use it when you are shopping. I compare Shopkicks, Ibotta, and Ebates before I make an online purchase for the best money back. Remember 250 kicks = \$1.00.
- Look in the online tap for the eye image. This is a check it out option and you may earn kicks just for looking at something online.
- Link your credit or debit cards but be sure to use them in stores as credit in order to earn kicks.

All and all, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 is don't bother and 5 is loving it, I give it a 4. It's a super simple grocery app with the potential to earn lots of points.













Receipt Hog

Receipt Hog is an "income generating" app in that you earn coins for your receipts that you can cash in for money with Amazon, PayPal or a Visa Gift Card.

What do you do? Use your smart phone to take photos of your receipts.

What do you earn? Coins, Spins, & Drawing Tickets

What is the payout? Payout is at 1000 (\$5), 2900 (\$15), 4300 (\$25), & 6500 (\$40). Leaving your earnings yields greater rewards, up to 6500 coins.

What I like about Receipt Hog? It's easy. I either do receipts as I get them or one evening during the week, I do all my receipts. It's a quick photo and go. I don't have to think about what I'm buying or where to go to get the deal. And you do have a record of your receipt. I have convinced a store to use it for a return before because they could pull the information off of the photo. I've also downloaded the receipt from the app to turn in for reimbursement when I lost the original.

What is the downside of Receipt Hog? It's not a huge payout as in it takes some time to earn the points. There is no bonus for referring friends.

Tips for Quicker Earnings

- Load every week. Each week you add receipts, you get credit. With a certain number of credits you "level up" As you level up you earn more coins for leveling up. My last level up earned 200 coins
- All receipts are not created equal. You earn coins for stores that sell grocery, health, and beauty products primarily. Your best receipts are supermarkets, convenience stores, super centers, club stores, pet supply, beauty & health stores, etc. Restaurants and clothing stores may get you spins (which can earn points) or tickets for a drawing.
- Watch for surveys. You'll see a red dot on rewards in the app which means you have a survey. I've only gotten a handful, but they are a quick 50-200 coins.
- There is a new Add to your browser feature. I just did it, but can't speak to how it helps (or hurts) yet.

All and all, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 is don't bother and 5 is loving it, I give it a 3 ½. To me, it's passive and easy. It won't make you rich but it will give you a little extra. If you're better than me at taking your photos, you can cash in easily!

Fetch Rewards

Fetch is an rewards app in that you earn points by turning in grocery receipts. Download the app or use the link (http://www.fetchrewards.com) to your phone and enter my referral code **EC4U**. When you scan your first receipt you'll receive a bonus of 2,000 points (and so will I ... thanks in advance)!

What do you do? Scan receipts for stores where you buy grocery items.

What do you earn? Most receipts with grocery items will get some points. If you purchase items in special offers or brand names in the app, you receive more points.

What is the payout? There are lots of gift cards to choose from and every 1,000 points is worth \$1. There is no advantage to stocking up points.

What I like about Fetch? Like most grocery receipt apps, it's easy. I just scan my receipt, wait a minute, and I have my points. I do occasionally use the specials and brands lists to create my grocery list and get more points or I take my list and make adjustments based on the app. It doesn't matter where you make the purchase, so if something is on sale and you get points, you can do well. The app itself is pretty nifty, too. It has a shopping list of the items that have points so you can check those off and create your own list.

What is the downside of Panel App? Brands tend to be name brands, which if you're not a brand shopper, your points won't add up as quickly.

Tips for Quicker Earnings

- Check the app often for bonuses like referrals or great points off. Remember 1,000 points is \$1 so if it's 750 points it's basically 75 cents off.
- Spend some time checking out the big bonus items and plan your shopping around those. In special offers today, I could save about \$6.50 (in generated points) and some of the items are on sale at my regular grocery spot an in other grocery apps.
- Scan any receipt that you can buy grocery and beauty items even the gas station. You may get the 25 points receipt scan.
- Scan receipts within 14 days of the sale.
- Use your app every 90 days or your points expire.

All and all, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 is don't bother and 5 is loving it, I give it a 4. It's a super simple grocery app with the potential to earn lots of points and I love apps where points = certain \$\$ amounts and I don't have to store them up to keep earning.

Stay Connected ... Following camp, stay in contact with the families throughout the year. Nurturing those relationships can help grow your program and fill your camp quotas.

Start Early ... In the very first newsletter of the year include the camp dates. It seems that families plan their summers earlier and earlier—make sure 4-H camp is a part of their plan!

Put Out the Welcome Mat...Be open to taking out of town or out of state cousins and friends. You would be surprised how appealing this is to families. Also, do not forget about younger siblings. 4th graders are the perfect age for Cloverleaf camp.

Ten for the Win...Include a checkbox on your camp application that encourages families to make a \$10 donation towards a camp scholarship. Parents are very likely to add ten more dollars to their deposits without hesitation.

Summer Camp Promotion Edition

Here comes the bus, the bus, the big yellow bus!

It's almost camp promotion time! This is my favorite part of the year...that is ...

besides camp of course! One of the first thoughts that runs through a 4-H Agent's head is, 'How can I reach my camp quota?'. What can I say, do, or present differently to entice the kids to sign up for 4-H Summer Camp?



First, begin camp promotion early. During January in-school club meetings is a great time to run into the classrooms dressed as an Indian, hillbilly or beachgoer and get the students excited about camp! Especially, after you show the camp promotional video they will be on board! Enclosed in your 4-H Newsletter, make



sure to include all the information about camp: dates, price, activities, grades and a payment schedule. Talk the students into inviting their best

friends to go with them to camp as a group. Kids are more likely to register if their friends are attending.

Second, hold a 'Camp Sign-Up Day' around February 1st. This gives families an entire 4 months or more to pay for camp. Having a

payment schedule that allows families to pay bi-weekly camp installments works very well. When 4-H'ers sign up for camp require them to pay a \$75 deposit to hold their spot. Also, create a camp sign-up form that includes: child's name, address, age, grade, gender, t-shirt size, swim Y/N, parents name, home phone, work phone, cell phone and email address. On this sign-up sheet you can keep track of payments made or scholarships received.

All of these efforts are not enough. There are many families that cannot afford summer camp. So, now this becomes your job because every child deserves the opportunity



to attend 4-H Summer Camp! Supplement the cost of camp with scholarships or fundraisers. It can be done. Each year Oglethorpe County 4-H sends 15-20 youth to 4-H summer camps on full or partial scholarships. How is this done? ASK, ASK, ASK & ASK some more. Ask county residents, county businesses, your family members. If you mention kids and camp people will open their wallets. Hold fundraisers. Sell Krispy Kreme donuts and/or certificates. We have even held a Spaghetti Supper Fundraiser. And let the youth seeking scholarships take an active role in working those fundraisers and earning their way to camp.

Love them, inspire them and they will learn on their own. LTK! Submitted by: Marcus Eason, Oglethorpe County





A Tribute to Mr. Harold Darden

Visionary, determined, generous, a dedicated leader ... Mr. Harold Darden had all of those qualities and used them in his service to others. Former Georgia 4-H State Leader Tom Rodgers called Mr. Darden one of the "giants of Georgia 4-H." He was born in Troup County, Georgia, on September 6, 1920, and passed away on September 18, 2018, at the age of 98.

A defining member of the "Greatest Generation," Mr. Darden served in WWII in the 345th Infantry "Golden Acorn" Division under General Patton, where he was awarded two bronze stars in the battles of the Rhineland and Central Europe. Following his return to the United States, Mr. Darden became a County Agent in DeKalb County, later transferring to Carroll County. He was asked to join the State 4-H staff after the summer of 1955. Upon his retirement in 1975, Mr. Darden was named Associate Professor Emeritus and Associate State 4-H Leader Emeritus.

Mr. Harold leaves a strong legacy of service to Georgia 4-H and is recognized as one of the eighteen founders of Rock Eagle 4-H Center.

He helped develop the camping program for Georgia 4-H and was the first chief of the Rock Eagle Nation. Mr. Darden wrote the Citizenship Ceremony in 1959 for the Georgia 4-H State Council. That impressive ceremony is still used today as a swearing-in of 4-H members who have become eligible to vote. In 2010, he was inducted into the National 4-H Hall of Fame, and he was awarded the Georgia 4-H Lifetime Achievement Award in 2013.

Harold Darden earned the titles of Honorary Master and Honorary Counselor, prestigious awards bestowed on few individuals. He worked with Para Lee Brock to create the *4-H Hour*, a Saturday morning program which for more than 25 years showcased Georgia 4-H'ers on Atlanta's WAGA television station. He and his relatives established the Darden Family Scholarship, a scholarship which each year benefits an outstanding camp counselor at Rock Eagle 4-H Center and an outstanding camp counselor at one of the small 4-H camps.

Harold once said, "We appreciate how far the right lessons learned in 4-H can take a young person in life. We know that character is more important than a credit score; we know that accomplishments cannot – must not – be measured in terms of wins and losses, but rather in lives we've helped to build. And so, we hope that our contributions will last for generations and that our influence will be felt long after the ribbons have faded and the medals have tarnished. So we need to remind ourselves – everyday – you and I, we are the chosen ones. We are the keepers. I'm of a mind that if there is any single factor that makes for success in life, it is the ability to profit from experience."

The foundation of the success of the Georgia 4-H program is strong because of the work and legacy of people like Mr. Harold Darden.
