In an effort to increase 4-H stakeholder interests and youth involvement, Putnam County 4-H worked with the editor of the Eatonton Messenger, Lynn Hobbs to create a newspaper piece to highlight the experiences of youth attending cloverleaf summer camp.

Kasey Hall's entry featured Jasper County 4-H'ers participation in the state Challenge Bowl contest where they placed first for the fourth consecutive year. She included information on how the competition was structured, summaries of each round, and quotes from 4-H'ers on the winning team.

Jacqueline Nunn created a series of workbooks to be utilized to help youth in 4th-6th grade learn about being a club meeting officer. The workbooks were created for the roles of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Reporter.

In an effort to increase agricultural awareness, the Elbert County Extension Office partnered with the Elberton 12-County Fair to open and operate an educational livestock/small animal barn for the public. This exhibit included live animals, Farm Gate values, educational posters and seminars to teach about local agriculture and available opportunities.

Educational Package-Individual: Jakyn Tyson

In an effort to teach Emanuel County, Georgia students about the components and importance of soil, the applicant developed the "Soil Components" educational piece. The one-hour lesson aims at teaching students about what makes up the soil around us and how and why its quality varies by location. The lesson includes an interactive worksheet for participants to chart their observations.

Designed to use during 5th grade in-school club meetings, the Plant Classification educational package contains information on preparing, facilitating, and evaluating three activities related to plant taxonomy, tree identification, and edible plants. By using research-based information and the experiential learning process, the authors developed a lesson that is both practical and interactive.

Walton County 4-H and Georgia 4-H provide a lot of opportunities for youth to get involved in our programs. The newsletter highlights the variety of hands-on 4-H opportunities specific to each age level along with other specialty programs available.

Phillip Petway, FVSU 4-H Agent for Twiggs County, ran a series of news articles entitled "4-H Healthy Teens" in the local newspaper The Twiggs Times New Era. Highlighted as a promotional video, the Georgia 4-H Music Education Matters Summit provides an experience for youth across Georgia, and around the nation, to practice and grow in music education, network and learn from industry professionals, and develop as a leader, team member, and performer. Summit participants, volunteers, and teachers share their experience to further programming, and encourage others in participation.

Beyond Youth Leadership: Lynn Davis

Turner County 4-H'ers practiced leadership skills and proved they knew 'A Thing or 2' about reading as they promoted literacy for over 400 children building social capital through teen volunteerism. If awarded, the money received will be used to continue the program and purchase books to support children's literacy development.

Extension county personnel, volunteers, specialists, and the national MyPI training staff teamed for a more resilient Georgia, launching MyPI (My Preparedness Initiative) Georgia, a three-time national award-winning and FEMA-funded youth preparedness, leadership, and educational outreach program. Collectively Gordon, Dougherty, Morgan, Turner, and Wilcox counties offered 7 sessions, enrolling 129 youth.

Denise Miller National 4-H Innovator: Kandi Edwards, Kris Peavy

6th - 8th grade students were attendees at two regional 4-H Financial Literacy College Conferences. The Randolph and Whitfield County 4-H Agents designed and hosted these events. Financial literacy topics highlighted included budgeting/financial planning, consumer spending, interest, debit/credit cards, checking/savings accounts, career/college preparation, workplace soft skills and leadership smarts.





Diversity and Inclusion: Dorothea Graham

Haralson County 4-H staff work with students that are in the Special Education Self Contained classrooms and with students in the HOPE Academy. Through this program, 90% of students increased knowledge in the areas of cooking, writing resumes, interview skills, job etiquette and working with generational differences.

Excellence in 4-H Club Support: Pam Bloch

The concept for Cloverbuds initially came from the obvious need for an opportunity to enjoy the benefits of being a member of 4-H at an early age. Many council members younger siblings had seen the excitement and fun that their older siblings were having while enrolled in the program, and desperately yearned for a chance to have the same experience. Cloverbuds provides a leadership opportunity for the high school members like no other.

Project GROWL (Growing Real Opportunities in Work and Life) aims to increase STEM focus at middle and high school levels relevant to agricultural sciences. GROWL encourages agricultural literacy efforts through the implementation of an urban garden, tours of USDA research facilities, and other hands-on activities and workshops.

Cox started an after school STEAM club for 5th and 6th graders. Each month offered challenges incorporating the concepts of STEAM. Students designed and built structures using engineering concepts. The committee worked together to plan three educational classes to increase environmental awareness among conference attendees, while also inspiring an interest in science and engineering.

Supported by a state teen pregnancy prevention grant, University of Georgia Extension 4-H/Positive Youth Development and Family and Consumer Science Agents across 30 counties trained 3,013 youth through in-school and afterschool programs to be relationship smarts.

For the third consecutive year, Bibb County 4-H was a part of the Earth Day Committee and Festival to not only plan the cities festival, but to also provide youth programming through the Earth Day Festival Kid Zone. The purpose of the kid zone is to get youth actively involved and thinking as environmental stewards. Through five stations ranging in activities, youth were engaged in learning opportunities focusing on different aspects of recycling and conservation. Upon completion of the five stations, youth received a t-shirt and had the opportunity to share their new knowledge on stage. Macon-Bibb County 4-H has been an essential part of the planning and programming of the Earth Day Kids' Zone since 2016.



Search for Excellence in Teen Programming: Lauren Dye, Sue Isbell






Randie Gray
