Walton County 4-H'er excels at Goat Grooming



Tippins Bank Junior Board Of Directors Proposed By Evans Co. 4-H'ers.



4-H'ers Pave the Way to a First Ever Junior Board of Directors in Evans County

"We need to provide leadership development for the county's youth and we hope that after they finish their secondary education, they'll come back to the community and take active leadership roles." The aforementioned comment by the Executive Director of the Claxton-Evans Chamber of Commerce, and statements similar in context regarding the lack of local leadership development opportunities for the youth of today, resound throughout Evans County on a regular basis. Community leaders, school administrators, educators, parents, and the alike, routinely comment on the need for local youth leadership development opportunities to help assist in fostering the leadership skills needed for today's youth to become successful and contributing citizens of tomorrow.

Unfortunately, in our small rural community, few leadership opportunities exist to help students gain the skills necessary to become productive leaders. In the past year,

Evans County senior 4-H members have worked diligently to help implement youth leadership opportunities – one such initiative is the 1st ever establishment of a Junior Board of Directors at a local bank. Students feel that a Junior Board of Directors would help local youth enhance their business/leadership skills while learning about the financial industry.

With the help of 4-H Agent Stephanie Myers, senior 4-H members prepared a PowerPoint presentation that provided an overview of the entire proposal, researched information on how a financial literacy program could be built into this leadership opportunity with classes, workshops, and seminars to help youth learn the importance of managing personal finances responsibly and researched/prepared a written report on how the Junior Board of Directors could be implemented at a local bank by giving pros/cons of implementing a Junior Board of Directors, sample guidelines for an implemented Board, sample selection processes and

sample monthly meeting criteria based off of information they acquired from other financial institutions that have such a Board in place. 4-H Agent and members arranged a meeting with the President of a local bank to present their Junior Board of Directors proposal. Their proposal was well received and Evans County 4-H Agent Stephanie Myers and the senior 4-H members were invited back to present the proposal to the Board of Directors at the bank. Two months later, the group received word from the bank President that the Board of Directors "were extremely impressed with the proposal and the presentation of the proposal and that the board had voted to approve the establishment of a Junior Board of Directors for their bank beginning with the next academic school year." 4-H Agent Stephanie Myers has been working with the bank President and staff to draw up member criteria and application processes for this newly created youth leadership opportunity in Evans County.

Are You Engaging Your Audience?

OK, I've got an agenda...great! Now, let's get some markers...how many will I need? Where's the flip chart....and the easel? Now, I need an icebreaker... an opener, an energizer and maybe a review....just in case. Index cards...do I really need them....oh, I might as well throw them into the box. What else may be cool? I'll grab some tennis balls, some stickers, a small stand. Anything else I may can use?

Have you ever found yourself in this situation? Perhaps it was early in the morning or even late in the afternoon as you pack up for an early meeting the next day. We have all had hundreds! The really secret to great facilitation is not props and equipment that can be seen or touched. So, if facilitation isn't about markers and pretty chart drawings, what is it?

I define facilitation as a way to teach and deliver the information by engaging the audience with a very neutral position. Although we seem to cross boundaries at times when we deliver the information, most students or participants are excited to share personal stories and answers.

When the students can draw from their own personal experiences, they are taking the classroom concepts and applying it to the real world. It's the "ah-ha" moment when you know the light bulb has just been turned on in their mind and they embrace the learning process.

There is no doubt that Kim Anderson was a great mentor to me when she worked closely with Georgia 4-H. I took one-on-one facilitation lessons from her that shaped my teaching style. Even though I had taught in the school system before Extension, I learned so many tools to help with facilitation. Below are some personal objectives I have incorporated into my presentations and programs.

1.) Warm-up: This may be an introduction, game or a quick review. I always want to create an open, upbeat atmosphere. Getting everyone's attention is my main focus. Some suggestions "who can remind us?" "what do you know about?" "who has something to add?" or who wants to tell us?"

2.) Introduction: I like to introduce a vocabulary word or state a situation and ask for responses or shout-outs. The objective is to make students comfortable saying answers without necessarily having to be right. It's setting the stage and encouraging participation.

3.) Teaching the Content: Most 4-H club meetings have a lesson plan from which we teach. It's always better if we are prepared and know the material before we conduct the meeting. Keeping your hands paper-free will open your body up visually to the students to encourage participation. You will also show confidence and this will allow you to write notes on the board or flipchart. Keep in mind there are 3 types of learning: visual, auditory and kinesthetic.

4.) Connect the Dots: Ask a student a question as to how the material being taught can be incorporated into his daily life. This is a way to label an experience. Be positive and even expand onto the answer to help bridge the gap into reality. This will help re-engage them and reaffirm their contributions.

5.) Wrap-up: Have quick reflections on the material. Students can create quick bumper stickers to summarize what they have learned from the lesson. Ask what questions are still out there? Reach inside the reflection process with something like "you may be thinking..."

I like to be enthusiastic, clear and encouraging. I am certainly not an expert on facilitation, but I hope to have shared some tips that I have found to be useful in my experiences whatever the audience. So, make an agenda, grab some stickers and colorful markers and just go for it!

4-H2O Pilot Curriculum a Success

The Newton County 4-H Home School club studied the 4-H2O pilot curriculum from Melanie Biersmith this year. Two senior 4-H'ers in the club taught about the watershed we live in, one month utilized an Enviroscape borrowed from Keep Covington Newton Beautiful, and another month featured the Project WET water cycle game.

The game was favorite as even the youngest pre-4-H'ers were able to take part in rolling the dice, running around the "water cycle" (yard), and collecting beads on their bracelets for reflection afterward.

Another month had 4-H'ers taking home water evaluation techniques to either try out at home or create a poster on to share.

As their service project, the 4-H'ers each chose a local park or other area with a water feature to clean up as part of the Great American Clean Up. Pictured are three of the families who teamed up to clean a beaver pond and a stretch of drainage ditches. They collected 11 bags of garbage!

Club president Mary Collart reported, "As far as I know, none of us litter, but it definitely gave us a new appreciation of all the work it takes to clean up the roads!"

Next fall's National Youth Science Day experiment is supposed to feature 4-H2O, so consider it as an addition to your curriculum for special clubs next year.



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
