Oglethorpe County 4-H Cooking to Share Project Club

Approximately half of reported foodborne illness cases occur in children under the age of 15 years. There are more than 2 million children under age 15 in Georgia. The risk of foodborne illness in children is higher due to lower body weight and underdeveloped immune systems. Children have a higher risk of developing serious complications from pathogens, such as *E. coli* and *Salmonella*, than do adults. In the U.S., per year, foodborne disease results in an estimated 48 million persons with gastrointestinal foodborne illnesses, 128,000 hospitalizations, and 3,000 deaths. Georgia ranks 9th in the U.S. in the number of cases of foodborne illness. In addition, every year, over 100,000 people are injured in a kitchen related accident. Children are all too often the victims of kitchen-related accidents in the home. Kitchen-related accidents consist of fires, cuts, burns, falls and poisonings.

Oglethorpe County 4-H has implemented a food preparation and safety education program with youth to teach safe food handling practices and kitchen safety. 'Cooking to Share' is a monthly afterschool 4-H program coordinated by Brad Averill, Family & Consumer Science Agent, and me that allow youth the hands-on opportunity to prepare a well-balanced meal and even learn healthy dessert options to include in a meal plan. Assisted by Oglethorpe County Primary School Food Pantry Coordinator, a needy family is identified and contacted,



a menu is developed, and food is purchased using donated funds. 4-H'ers wash, cut, mix and cook the meal under the direction and watchful eyes of Senior 4-H'ers and adult volunteers. The prepared meal is then given to the identified family in need.



Since the first 'Cooking to Share' was held in February 2013, approximately 650 youth have participated, \$2,000 have been donated to purchase supplies and ingredients. The Cooking to Share program has impacted the lives of 28 Oglethorpe families in their time of need. Oglethorpe County is home to 1,500 impoverished families. 4-H'ers learned how to create and serve nutritious meals instead of cheap non-nutritious foods, such as hot dogs. The families involved are always very appreciative and thankful for our efforts. Many community partners have come together for this project such as, local businesses, churches, Action Inc., the Primary School Food Pantry, School Counselors and DFCS. After administering a pre/post test on the 'Cooking to Share' Project Club 95% of the participating

4-H'ers stated that they had significantly increased their knowledge of: Understanding foodborne illness, how to prepare and cook food properly, how to work safely in the kitchen, how to avoid kitchen-related accidents, how to prepare nutritious meals and understanding the need to help those less fortunate then themselves. Many 4-H parents state that their child gains confidence in the kitchen by participating in the 'Cooking to Share' program and want to begin helping cook family meals. The 'Cooking to Share' Project Club is a win-win for everyone, families in need are receiving healthy meals, youth are gaining confidence in the kitchen and learning to cook, teenagers are building on their leadership abilities and the Oglethorpe County 4-H Club is supporting the community.

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4-H Middle School Movie Night

National 4-H Council Youth in Action Award

So many times different contests, awards, and opportunities cross our desks (or should it be cross our inboxes?), and I have been guilty to glance and delete. One of the greatest privileges we have as 4-H professionals is to extend opportunities to our young people ... particularly opportunities they may not have elsewhere.

If you've ever met Sophia Rodriguez, cheerful, intelligent, and personable are some of the many words you could use to describe her. I'll never forget the day she walked into my office, and she explained what she wanted to do for her Leadership in Action Project: "I just want to tie-dye a bunch of stuff with the kids at Fort Stewart, because they need love and support." After we sat down and really planned out the project, she set out to make a difference, and I'm confident she accomplished her goal.

It was an incredible experience connecting her with the research and resources needed to plan, implement, and evaluate a project that focused on the emotional well-being of military-connected youth using art. Watching her ideas come to life was rewarding. Being able to stand beside her and present her project at the National Youth-at-Risk Conference was an honor. Seeing her be honored as a National 4-H Council Youth in Action award recipient was inspiring. I had the privilege to join her on this journey; I watched a project morph and grow, saw her empower others to expand her work, and got to see first-hand the life skills she developed on this journey. This opportunity only exists because of 4-H.

This fall, National 4-H Council is looking for 4-H'ers who are ready to share their story through the 2019 4-H Youth in Action Awards. While you may not feel as if you know an award-worthy 4-H member, I encourage you to think again. It's the process, not the end result, which is the true privilege. Seek out your 4-H members who have completed work in our core pillar areas of Agriculture, Civic Engagement, Healthy Living and STEM. They may be named a winner and receive a \$5,000 scholarship for higher education, but more importantly, they develop critical life skills – communication, critical thinking, planning & organizing, and even decision-making skills. Encourage them on their journey. Connect them with resources that can enhance their work. Take time and listen. Help them achieve their goals. While the time and opportunities may seem expansive, they really quite limited. I was reminded of that a few weeks ago when Sophia didn't attend our monthly Jr/Sr 4-H meeting, because she's now a student at the University of Georgia.

"The support of a local 4-H professional throughout the 4-H Youth in Action process is invaluable," said Abbey Tillman, program coordinator for National 4-H Council. "You have the expertise and, most importantly, the relationship with the young person to encourage him or her to apply and to put together an application reflective of their work and 4-H experiences." As a small thank you, 4-H professionals whose youth apply for 4-H Youth in Action are also entered in a drawing for Shop 4-H gift certificates.

Life Lessons from Dr. Seuss

The man we all knew as Dr. Seuss passed down life lessons through his animated cartoon books. Make the world better. "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better, It's not."- Dr. Seuss.

Turner County 4-H and Turner County School students proved they knew 'A Thing or 2' about reading as they promoted literacy for children of all ages. "You could not would not want to miss a celebration such as this!" said Dr. Seuss and so they celebrated reading and the birthday of Dr. Seuss through the National Education Association's Read Across America.

Under my leadership, approximately 70 youth practiced their leadership skills and worked together to achieve a common goal of reaching over 400 youth. This group project was a great catalyst for students undertaking a joint goal and engaging youth to improve their community. Our 4-H Pledge advocates "for our club, community, country and world."

These teens have practiced leadership, citizenship and life skills. Through this community engagement piece, Turner County 4-H is helping to build social capital where not expected. Turner County Middle School 7th and 8th graders learned about the pillars of character and leadership through their 4-H lessons. Two focus groups reflected on their local community and identified opportunities for their direct involvement. These middle school focus groups

read to 349 students in Pre-K, Kindergarten, First and Second grades on two separate days. An 11th grader coordinated a week-long reading program at Lil Blessings Daycare and Learning Center for approximately 75 children and adults. "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." – Dr. Seuss.

Turner County 4-H's County Council also joined the "Seusstastical" fun creating oversized decorations to beautify the school hallways and doors. Certified teen leader Sophie McCard shared "through my work with the Dr. Seuss project, Mrs. Lynn has inspired me to be a humble and helpful community leader!"

Immediately following the reading event, students shared that they felt important and they felt like they would be successful in life. "Today was good. Today was fun. Tomorrow is another one."- Dr. Seuss.

A recent study by U.S. News and World Report indicated a correlation between student engagement and academic success. Engaged students-those with emotional connections to their schools-were more likely to attend class and participate actively in learning. Additional findings found evidence between students having higher school grade point averages, graduation rates, and measures of college success. And one final quote and life lesson from Dr. Seuss "And will you succeed? Yes you will indeed! (98 and ¾ percent guaranteed.)







Multi-County 4-H Summer Fun Days

During the summer we are always looking for new ways to engage our 4-H'ers and keep them involved while school is out. This past summer, Lanier, Lowndes, and Tift counties partnered together to enhance our summer programs. Through the collaboration of community partners, all three Extension program areas, and multiple counties, our 4-H'ers experienced many new things and were able to learn while having a blast! We had three FULL days of fun and education on June 26, 27, and 28! Over thirty 4-H'ers from Lanier, Lowndes, and Tift counties joined together during our 4-H Summer Fun Days. Each day was about a different subject. These day camps were coordinated by Ashley Carroll, Tift County 4-H Agent; Lynn Hall, Lowndes County 4-H Agent; Megan Powell, Lanier County 4-H Agent; and Emily Teatro, Lowndes County 4-H Program Assistant.

Our first day was 'Cooking' day at the Lanier County Extension Office in Lakeland, Georgia. 4-H'ers were able to learn about food and knife safety, practice good handwashing techniques, measure solids and liquids correctly, and learn about nutrition. They also got to play games and make and eat tasty snacks like peanut butter cookie dough bites, fruit and yogurt parfaits, berry popsicles, trail mix, and English muffin pizzas. Rachel Hubbard, Lanier County Family and Consumer Sciences Agent, provided expertise and teaching throughout the day during cooking day.

Day two was dedicated to 'STEM' principles. We hosted STEM Day at the Youth IMPACT Center in Lakeland, Georgia. The IMPACT Center has two classrooms and an activity center equipped with ping pong tables, foosball tables, board games, movie theater area, and more! 4-H'ers were able to compete in STEM challenges, do physical and chemical changes experiments, play in the Youth IMPACT Center activity area, and learn about and see live honeybees. Kim Kester, Lanier/Clinch County Agriculture and Natural Resources Agent, brought her honeybees and taught about their importance. The bees were a hit with the 4-H'ers!

Our final day was focused on 'Water' at the Lowndes County Extension Office in Valdosta, Georgia. 4-H'ers were able to learn about water and the environment through the Enviroscape, see the difference between adhesion and cohesion with water droplets, play outside water Olympics, and enjoy a slip-n-slide.

I encourage you to partner with other counties near you to offer new and different opportunities for your 4-H'ers. Not only did the kids have fun, we did too!












Curriculum Corner


