First Agricultural Field Day Success

Dougherty County 4-H along with Dougherty County School System's Career, Technical, and Agricultural Education Department put on Dougherty County's first Agricultural Field Day. More than 700 seventh grade students from Merry Acres Middle School, Albany Middle School, and Radium Springs Middle Magnet School of the Arts gathered on the campus of Merry Acres Middle to attend the event.

Currently, the Dougherty County School System has no agricultural pathway at the middle or high school level. The field day was piloted to bring awareness to youth on where their food comes from, the importance of the agriculture industry to the state of Georgia and expose them to various career opportunities. Dougherty County Extension staff and Dougherty County School System officials hope the field day sparked enough interest among students to reintroduce an agricultural pathway. Five agricultural tracks were represented at the field

day. Participants were able to visit exhibitors representing Agricultural Business, Horticulture, Animal Science, Row Crops, and Natural Resources and Environmental Education. Students had the opportunity to observe eggs being laid, different types of farming equipment and appropriate planting techniques, just to name a few.

Several organizations and businesses join Dougherty County Extension to make the first Ag Field Day possible. Those involved included; Dougherty County Farm Bureau, Southwest Georgia Master Gardeners and Extension Volunteers, Flint Ag Company, Georgia Peanut Commission, Georgia Forestry Commission, Harry James Unlimited, UGA Stripling Irrigation Research Park, Poultry Palace, Golden Peanut and Tree Nut, USDA Natural Resources and Conservation Service, Flint River Fresh and Georgia Grown.

Autumn Holsey, 7th grade 4-Her at Albany Middle School, says, "I loved Ag Field Day! I learned so much about how to work a tractor from Mr. James and how important water is to farmers." Autumn also said that she hopes AG Field Day is offered to 8th graders next year so she can participate again.

Generation Rx

Generation Rx is free resource provided by the Ohio State University College of Pharmacy and the Cardinal Health Foundation. The educational materials include lesson plans, handouts, fact sheets, etc. designed to help prevent the misuse of prescription drugs. Their mission is to educate people of all ages about the potential dangers of misusing prescription medication and enhance medication safety among youth and adults.

Their educational toolkit is designed for different audiences: elementary, teen, college, adult, older adult, patient, and workplace. The toolkits include resources such as an introductory letter, activity stations and games (along with facilitator guides), worksheets and visual aids. The resources are also provided in Spanish.

Training Games

Leadership in the Movies





"Leadership in the Movies" lesson is designed for middle and high school students. Produced by Adrianne .H Cox (ahcox@uga.edu), 4-H Agent in Harris County, the lesson is intended to have students discuss leadership qualities and traits, particularly as they relate to movie clips. The videos are embedded in the Power Point file, so you'll need a projector and sound to teach the lesson. The last video in the activity is the "4-H Grows Leaders" video. It takes at least 30-45 minutes to facilitate the activity, sometimes longer with lengthy discussions. Developing Scientific Minds through Hands-On Experiments

To most people, this next generation, that so many of us within Extension and 4-H work with daily, seems hopeless. These youth are hopelessly attached to technology without any true connection to the world around them. They do not have a means to operate on their own or to think for themselves. As Extension/4-H professionals, we are given the mission to change the trajectory of this next generation. We do so by stimulating the mind to think for itself and to do so critically. We stir up the heart to produce greater loyalty to the family, friends, and country our hearts hold so dear. We train hands to do more than type and tap but rather to serve others and to execute the creativity the mind produces. We direct the youth under our care to lead healthy lives; lives capable of living.

To fulfill this calling as a member of the 4-H family, my office and I created a lesson on flooding from the curriculum found within Project WET for fourth graders in our county. During the lesson, we were able to show

examples of flooding from newscasts from local news channels. We discussed with the students what causes extreme flooding, especially within urban settings. Youth were able to grasp difficult concepts like the permeability of different surfaces and soils, all the while piecing together how this lesson connected with previous lesson topics like the water cycle and severe weather.

During the planning stages, we predicted that some students may struggle to comprehend the content. Therefore, we deigned an experiment within the classroom that simulated flooding within areas of high soil permeability and areas of low soil permeability. The supplies were simple and inexpensive: aluminum pans, cheap sponges, plastic bags, Styrofoam cups, and tap water. The aluminum pans represented any area that holds water: a creek, a river, a lake, or even a student's yard. The sponges

represented the ground, while the plastic bags represented concrete or any other impermeable surface that would cover the ground. The cup functioned as a basin



to hold the water to pour into the pan and to put back into the cup in between using the plastic bags and not using them.

Needless to say, working hands-on with youth is far more rewarding than when standing in front of them attempting to teach them about confusing concepts such as permeability. Giving youth, no matter what grade they are in, the ability to think critically by doing something with their hands that they can touch, hold, manipulate, engineer, and create is far more important to the development of this generation than it ever has been before. Virtual simulations have their value and place within the classroom. We are blessed to be able to stand on the shoulders of giants, our beyondvalue and highly underappreciated classroom teachers, and help mold these kids into the selfsustaining, scientifically-minded leaders of tomorrow through hands-on experiments like this one.

National Drug Chat Day

Project GROWL (Growing Real Opportunities in Work & Life)

Project GROWL provides urban after-school agricultural and environmental education programming to middle and high school youth within two communities in Clayton County and Fulton County, GA. Programming for Project GROWL consists of five themes: advocacy and communication, urban agricultural education, urban environmental education, policy and governance, and leadership and sustainability. This urban agricultural model explores new opportunities and enhances audiences through Extension programming. Youth are definitely "learning by doing" and are not afraid of getting dirty in the process!

The sustainable programming model equips communities to empower themselves. With populations within urban communities expanding, the need for sustainable, healthy, and affordable food increases, along with the need for people to understand and advocate for urban agricultural systems. Youth in Project GROWL attend workshops and events across the state to help increase their agricultural literacy. These events also teach and build on professional and personal development skills, like leadership, goal setting, critical thinking, and problem solving.

Throughout the past year, youth engaged in programming at various agricultural locations, including visits to research labs in Tifton and urban garden tours in Atlanta. Youth also tended to the Project GROWL 4-H Club garden located at the Camp Fulton/Truitt 4-H Center in College Park, GA. The garden supplies year-round harvests, including tomatoes, herbs, and greens. Youth decorated the garden with hand-painted signs and individually designed bee boxes to showcase their sense of belonging with Project GROWL and Georgia 4-H!



Diversity, Inclusion, and Extension

Bryan County 4-H Remembers Veterans

With the establishment of the Fort Stewart Military Reservation in 1940 and Hunter Army Airfield nearby, Bryan County is in close proximity to more than 57,000 military personnel and their families. Bryan County's population has doubled over the past 20 years becoming the 61st fastest growing county in the United States. Much of this new population is due to military personnel moving into the area. Military families are such an influence on the economics, education, and growth in Bryan County; we not only owe the military thanks for their service in our community, we also owe them thanks for their service to our country and defending our rights.

Our local American Legion Post 164 recognizes veterans who are no longer with us in body, but their spirit is remembered in the community. This year, the members of the American Legion Post 164 were unable to fulfill the remembrance activities due to health issues. They called upon Bryan County 4-H to help recognize veterans on Memorial Day & Veterans Day.





Over two days, large United States flags and crosses were placed in downtown Pembroke. Each cross was freshly painted and bore the name of a veteran and in which war they served. We placed smaller flags at the graves of all veterans buried in the county. Two local veterans with the American Legion accompanied us as we cleared debris from graves, placed new flags at their headstones, and properly disposed of weathered flags. Stories of heroic deeds about some of the veterans were told to us as we worked to honor our veterans. Over 250 flags were displayed on the graves of veterans. During the remembrance activities, 4-H'ers commented on what they had learned during the process: they learned the importance of remembering those who gave so much of themselves to ensure we have a better life, there is a proper way to dispose of weathered flags respectfully, there are more veterans than we imagined buried in our community, and there is a rich history in Bryan County that should be preserved.

Give It Up

In September, Fort Valley State University 4-H'ers in Houston County participated in a Civic Engagement lesson, through National 4-H Common Measures. Students at Achieve Academy, a home school base student-centered learning environment currently serving students in grades two through eight, took part in the meaning of civic engagement and community service. Students had the chance to understand how civic engagement can make a difference in the day-to-day life of our communities. 4-H'ers were asked "what challenges of the world and local issues do you see?" Students brought up issues of child abuse, hunger and homelessness. During the lesson, 4-H'ers had the chance to share knowledge, skills, values, and motivation that they felt can make a difference in our communities.

4-H'ers decided to conduct an outreach project "Give it Up"! Students began researching local nursing homes, homeless shelters, and youth organizations in the area that their 4-H club would "give back" to. In October, the 4-H students decided to adopt the Rainbow House Children's Resource Center. The Rainbow House Children's Resource Center (Rainbow House CRC) is an organization devoted to reducing the occurrence of child abuse and assisting victims. Throughout Houston County, Rainbow House CRC coordinates community efforts in child abuse education, advocacy, treatment, family support, prevention, and training. The house itself is a child-friendly facility where children feel more comfortable talking about their situation.

Students collected cleaning supplies, Kleenex, paper goods (tissue, paper cups), and juice boxes. Over 100 items were collected and given to the Rainbow House CRC in November. Give It Up was a huge success and the impact was felt in the community.





4-H Tech Changmakers Project: The Possibilities are Endless!

National 4-H Council and Microsoft have partnered together to bridge the connectivity gap in rural areas across the United States with the goal of fostering "a sustainable future where everyone has access to the benefits technology provides and the opportunities it creates". The 4-H Tech Changemakers program supplies youth with the equipment and technical assistance they require to be providers of educational opportunities that address the technical literacy needs in their community. Community centers, senior centers, libraries, school parent-teacher organizations, health fairs, churches, and other community agencies are potential 4-H partners and recipients of these technical events.

Dr. Lori Bledsoe, the Northwest Program Development Coordinator, was awarded a Microsoft grant for the Catoosa, Gordon, and Whitfield counties to become 4-H Tech Changemakers. Seven 4-H'ers and their adult leaders attended the 4-H Tech Changemakers Training held at the 4-H Youth Development Center in Columbus, Ohio, on February 28 - March 2. This training gave 4-H'ers a wealth of technical knowledge and introduced various adult delivery methods and techniques that they will use. Participants also learned about the various challenges they may face while delivering these services.

After identifying potential community partners that may assist them and venues where these classes might be held, 4-H'ers created a plan of action that outlined the necessary steps to be taken in delivering these classes to their communities. Common Measures evaluation surveys will be conducted to assess the impact of these classes. While the 4-H Tech Changemakers will be teachers of digital literacy and Internet safety and security, they will also do what 4-H'ers do best – learn experientially. On April 13, these newly-trained digital ambassadors will host a 4-H Tech Changemakers training for other 4-H'ers in their counties that will join their county team. Look forward to reading more about these 4-H Tech Changemakers as they take advantage of this awesome partnership and share their acquired knowledge with in their counties!









<u>Life 101 - Financial Literacy Retreats</u>

The 4-H Agents in Randolph and Whitfield Counties were awarded an Innovative Grant from the University of Georgia College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences that provided \$5,000 monetary support for two financial literacy conferences targeting 6th -8th graders. The two-day Life 101 Financial Literacy Conferences reached 86 youth from Georgia and two participants from Florida. These conferences incorporated the Georgia 4-H key values of leadership, citizenship, and healthy living skills development. Designed to increase their financial knowledge and stimulate their awareness concerning the importance of this knowledge, Life 101 challenged students to put their knowledge into practice in various life experiences.

College campus venues were chosen to provide the participants with an introduction to college life and give them opportunities to have discussions about "what they want to be" with their college student tour guides.

The conferences were hosted on the Dalton State and Andrew College campuses to provide the 4-H'ers with an overnight stay in a dorm room. Youth created a "Piggy Bank" as a part of their registration. Winners of the "Piggy Bank" contest were awarded prize money donated by the local banks and presented by their representatives.

The Life 101 conferences had a guest speaker that facilitated an interactive financial timeline demonstration, "Where will you be in 15 years from now?" 4-H'ers became contestants in game shows that focused on financial literacy themes: "The Price is Right, or Is It?" and "Career Jeopardy". Students were divided into groups and rotated from class to class every 35 minutes. The financial literacy topics discussed included: budgeting, banking basics, debit and credit cards, goal setting and financial planning. The Saturday "Life" classes participants attended supplied necessary knowledge and activities to help these 4-H'ers make positive financial decisions in the future.









Chanleigh Underwood : Three Time Master 4-H'er

"Glitz and Glam, Let's Show Some Ham"....this was the title for a Cloverleaf DPA speech for 5th grade 4-H member, Chanleigh Underwood in 2014. She presented this Cloverleaf DPA project in Pork Production where she placed 1st. Chanleigh was new to the presentation side of 4-H, but she was no stranger to opportunities 4-H had to offer in the livestock program. Chanleigh has been showing pigs with Jeff Davis County 4-H since she was four years old in the pre-club 4-H Livestock program. Starting at an early age has peaked her interest in the pork project and has served her well in the last eight years at the Georgia Junior National Livestock Show held each year in Perry.

In the 5th grade, when she presented her speech about showing pigs, Chanleigh used first-hand knowledge of showing pigs and brought it to life for those in the pork project. She has carried this knowledge and love for the program on to achieve high status among 4-H members statewide. Underwood won the Georgia National Junior Market Gilt Show for the first time in 2013 as a 4th grader with her pig Tootsie, earning her first Master Status. In 2014, there was repeat in the hog barn when Chanleigh and her pig Angel took home the honors of Grand Champion Market Gilt earning her a second Master 4-H'er Status as a 5th grader. She has also placed in the top five, four of the eight years she has competed.



The Georgia National Junior Livestock Show was held once again in Perry, February 20-23, 2019. Chanleigh and her gilt, Thunder, brought home top honors from the state as Overall Grand Champion Market Gilt. This win once again, earns Master 4-H status for Underwood. A three time Master 4-H Member is no small feat and comes from dedication and hard work. Chanleigh devotes many hours to the training, working and caring for her show pigs. While others in the community are involved in sports, showing and raising show pigs is Chanleigh's sport. She works after school every day, on weekends and holidays, rain, shine, hot or cold, to earn these high honors. In addition to winning overall Grand Champion Gilt, Chanleigh was the 1st place winner for 10th grade showmanship. Her dedication to the project prevailed for her once again as she brought home top awards in this prestigious event.



Chanleigh's love for her show pigs has become a way of life for her and her family. Currently, she works with her dad to breed and raise show pigs at their family barn. She has been raising pigs of her own for two years. When farrowing season begins in mid to late July, Chanleigh is on watch for newborn pigs. She spends long, hot hours in the farrowing barns monitoring the safe delivery of newborn pigs.

These pigs are later sold to other youth exhibitors for show pigs. This past year, she raised six litters and at the 2019 State Show, one of the pigs she raised was selected as a Division Champion. Chanleigh will use this gilt in the coming year to raise more pigs for her operation.

Chanleigh states that the best thing about showing pigs for her has been the people she has met and the friends she has made over the years. Her favorite 4-H activity is definitely showing livestock and she states she would never choose anything over showing her pigs. When asked how she would promote the show pig



industry or encourage others to show, Underwood says, "To me it's fun! I love the task of gaining the pig's trust and then teaching them to walk proud. Yes, walk proud may sound silly, but the pig has to learn to trust you......My pigs are my teammates and it's so rewarding." 4-H and the livestock program has had an impact on Underwood since she began showing pigs as a young girl. Chanleigh has gained confidence showing pigs and she says, "I was a shy little girl who would hide behind my parents. My first year showing, I cried before entering the ring at every show, but my parents pushed me because I loved the pigs so much at home. Then one day it just clicked and when I stepped into the show ring nothing mattered but doing my best." Consistent devotion to her dreams has kept Underwood pressing forward to reach her goals... she says, "When I was seven I began showing pigs for Zack Bridges and I still do to this day." Chanleigh has a love for animals, especially pigs, and plans to continue to show pigs throughout high school. After high school, she plans to attend the University of Georgia to become a pharmacist and continue to raise livestock.

Chanleigh is the 16 year old daughter of Chad and Autumn Underwood and attends Jeff Davis High School. She is an advocate for the livestock industry, and the 4-H program and understands the importance of agriculture to our community and our state. Chanleigh also understands the importance of raising healthy animals and she has devoted herself to the task. While others are chasing their dreams along other avenues, you can find her chasing hers in the barn. Jeff Davis County 4-H wishes her the best as she continues to strive to "Make the Best Better".


BECOME AN ACTIVE PART OF YOUR ASSOCIATION
