2021 Friend of 4-H: Doris Belcher

Since 1974, the Georgia Association of Extension 4-H Youth Development Professionals has recognized the outstanding support and personal involvement in Georgia 4-H programming efforts with the Friend of 4-H Award. Given to an individual, group of people, or business/organization, this award signifies important contributions in helping to fulfill the Georgia 4-H vision and mission. Mrs. Doris Belcher was awarded this prestigious award posthumously at the recent State 4-H Congress. She attended Butts County schools and later graduated from Fort Valley State University in 1957 with a Home Economics Education Degree. After college she served as a Columbia County Extension 4-H agent until her retirement in 1989. She had so many state and national 4-H competition winners during the years, that she was honored by the Georgia Master 4-H Club as an honorary member. Mrs. Doris was offered other positions in the state but she loved her Columbia County 4-H'ers and her large group of adult 4-H volunteers so much, that she chose to stay in Columbia County throughout her career. Doris was a life member in the National and Georgia Associations of Extension Home Economists serving as State Vice President, life member in the National and Georgia Associations of Extension 4-H Agents serving as state President, and was a life member of Epsilon Sigma Phi. Doris received many State and National awards and recognitions during her career, and her highest recognition was the University of Georgia, College of Agriculture and Environmental Sciences, D.W. Brooks award. During retirement she served as a member of the Georgia 4-H Advisory Council. Doris was very active in her community and along with four other volunteers she helped organized Harlem's "Attic Treasures" thrift store in 2008. Profits from the store benefited dozens of area non-profit community service organizations. She also spent hours working with Harlem's Relay for Life and was recognized by the Harlem Woman's Club as "Woman of the Year." In retirement she and her dear friend, Dot Cofer, McDuffie County Extension retiree, continued to travel together across the United States to National 4-H Agents Association meetings. 4-H people from all across the United States knew and loved Doris Belcher. She loved working with the Georgia 4-H agent's association. Many of the older members will remember her decorations of Rock Eagle the year she was Vice President of the organization. Being the 50th anniversary year, as you drove into Rock Eagle you drove through a big cake (plywood) at the entrance. The night meal was served by the lake with a floating 6 by 6 foot "cake" lit with battery powered lights floating in the moon's reflection. To end the final luncheon she and Dot Cofer constructed a large 4 tier "4-H" shaped cake with association decorations that fed all members and guests. The base of the cake was four individual 10 inch cakes in a clover pattern. Even cloverleaf circle was decorated with a gigantic clover made of corral fencing covered with white material! Doris greeted everyone with a smile, but she will be remembered most for her words of encouragement that she offered to those that took their time to listen to her words of wisdom. The world needs more people like Doris Belcher. In 4-H we are to make our best better. In Doris's lifetime she always strived to make her best better while encouraging others to make their best better.

Cooking Challenge Day Camp

Cooking reality shows are among the most unique and hilarious entertainment available today. They can also be a source of inspiration and education. Jackson County 4-H started the Cooking Challenge Day Camp and themed it after several reality cooking shows. The camp's primary purpose was to provide food and cooking education to 4th – 8th grade youth. Using funds from the Wal-Mart Healthy Habits grant, the 4-H staff were able to purchase 10 sets of cookware, hot plates, cutting boards, and recipe ingredients. The camp started with a day of basics: food nutrition, kitchen safety, and how to properly use kitchen utensils. For the first full day of cooking, the youth divided into pairs and prepared to compete for the best dish in three rounds of cooking. This day was themed after Guy's Grocery Games and made use of a variety of food and health trivia throughout the day which the youth could then use for an advantage. The advantages included freezing a rival team for 60 seconds, forcing another person to wear an Avenger's Infinity Gauntlet (thus meaning they couldn't use their hand), or getting help from an adult or teen leader for 2 minutes. The second day of cooking was themed after Chopped and made use of a variety of mystery ingredients and mystery recipes. Throughout these two days of cooking the youth made use of a variety of different cooking techniques and were challenged to practice their skills on harder recipes each round. The final day of the camp was full of dessert, Nail'd It style. This was a sweet treat at the end of the week as the youth learned how to handle and work fondant, icing bags, different methods for spreading and decorating. The youth started the day off simple with a lemon-themed cookie and then progressed up to a sunflower cupcake, and then a lamb-themed cake. It wouldn't be Nail'd It however if the advantages weren't reintroduced to hilarious results. In between bouts of cook-offs and comedic advantages, the 4-H staff provided youth valuable instruction and reminders about responsibility. After each cook-off the youth were responsible for cleaning up their station, washing their pots, sweeping the floor, and throwing away leftover scraps. The camp also taught youth communication and teamwork, working with a partner required youth to coordinate their efforts preparing ingredients and maintaining their stations. The Cooking Challenge camp is the hopeful start to a series of cooking programs in Jackson County.



Kids Count Data Usage and Training


Kids Count provides legislators, public officials and child advocates with reliable data, policy recommendations and tools to advance programs that benefit children. Kids Count is a project of the Annie E. Casey Foundation and a premier source of data on children and families. Each year, the Foundation produces a comprehensive report — the Kids Count Data Book — that assesses child well-being in the United States. The indicators featured in the Data Book are also available in the Data Center. You can search data by state, county, school district, city and more and look at specific topics such as demographics, economic well-being, education, safety and risky behaviors, health and more. These resources provide great data for any professionals who serve youth. Information can be helpful for justifying 4-H use of instructional time in schools, conducting community needs assessments and completing grant applications. 4-H Open House

Because of the decreased face-to-face opportunities available to 4-H youth in 2020 due to the lingering challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, Tift County 4-H saw a major drop in youth and adult participation during the 2021 4-H Program Year. Lack of access to in-school audiences and an overreliance on virtual programming made member recruitment and retainment extremely difficult. In an effort to kickoff the 2022 4-H Program Year, recruit new members, reengage current members and connect with parents and potential volunteers, the Tift County 4-H team hosted its first 4-H Open House. The event showcased all portions of the program including S.A.F.E. shooting teams, livestock opportunities, judging teams, club meetings, summer camp, Project Achievement and other competitive and service events with a Teen Leader or Volunteer representative and sign up information. The event was designed to be hands on and engaging for all visitors. Students had the opportunity to test their marksmanship skills by shooting the 4-H BB Team guns, guide livestock around the arena, play games, participate in a photo booth and follow the scavenger hunt through the various programs to earn door prizes and Krispy Kreme doughnuts. More than 150 youth and adults attended the 4-H Open House! Since the event in mid-August, we have had an overwhelming increase in participation by youth and engagement with parents. The event has allowed us to increase our contact list for event promotion and extend opportunities to youth who otherwise would not be able to participate. As a direct result of the 4-H Open House, we doubled the size of our Cotton Boll and Consumer Judging team and increased Jr/Sr Meeting participation by over 60%. We have also made vital connections with 12 new adult volunteers! Because of the successful event, we also expect to increase participation in county level programs and 4-H summer camp!









4-H'ers attend Crop Scouting & Agricultural Education Event

The Southeastern 4-H Crop Scouting School was held July 27-29. This was a collaborative effort between Alabama, Florida, and Georgia Extension to educate 4-H youth (7th-12th Grade) on Scouting techniques used in the Southeast. The planning committee for the event consisted of Cody Bowling, UGA Extension Seminole County ANR Agent, Andrew Warner, UGA Extension Wilkes County ANR agent, Reid Miller, UGA Extension Hart County ANR agent, Brian Hayes, UGA Extension Mitchell County ANR, Cale Cloud UGA Extension Grady County ANR, Sedrick Mack, Regional Extension Agent Alabama Cooperative Extension, Ethan Carter, Regional IPM Agent UF/IFAS Jackson County Extension, and Cindy Meadows, Seminole County 4-H Agent. 4-H'ers from Seminole, Mitchell, Grady and Decatur counties participated in this 3-day educational event.

Day 1: 4-H'ers received presentations in the morning session from area UGA ANR agents on cotton, corn, soybean, peanut, and grain sorghum production practices along with commonly found pest in crops. The following ANR agents that led sessions throughout the week were Cody Bowling Seminole County, Cale Cloud Grady County, Brian Hayes Mitchell County, Andrew Warner Wilkes County, and Reid Miller Hart County. In the afternoon session, 4-H'ers visited the Wiregrass Research and Education Center in Headland, AL. Mr. Chris Parker, Wiregrass Station farm manager, gave a presentation on the history of the station and the current agricultural research being conducted. Mr. Sedrick Mack, Alabama Extension Service, also toured the group around the station showing them baleage operations, peanut research plots, and cotton variety trials.

Day 2: The first stop was at Donalsonville Sod Farm with Brad Clarke. He talked to the group about sod production practices, pest management and equipment. Next Dr. Camp Hand, UGA Cotton Specialist, spoke to the group about cotton physiology, importance of the Statewide Cotton Variety Trial, and 4-H'ers scouted for pests. After lunch the group went to SunSouth with Brian Harrell. The 4-H'ers toured the facilities and learned about career opportunities with John Deere. The fourth stop was with Bill Conrad, a Florida Farmer, that showed the group the group perennial peanuts and alfalfa production in Florida. The final stop was with Amy Thompson (AAA Aviation), Shelton Lott (AAA Aviation), and Curtis Snell (Seminole Aviation). The 4-Her's learned about crop dusting technology and career opportunities.

Day 3: The first stop was at Foundation Seed in Marianna, Florida. Tommy Hamilton and John Beuttenmuller spoke to group about the peanut grading and shelling facility. The next stop Dr. Nicholas DiLorenzo, Professor of Animal Science and Research, spoke to the 4-H'ers about the animal research being conducted and the bull test located at the North Florida Research and Education Center. After lunch, Cody Bowling spoke to the group about Bermuda Grass stem maggot identification and management. The event wrapped up with a tubing trip at Bear Paw in Marianna where Ethan Carter and Rome Etheredge talked about invasive and native aquatic species. Also, special thanks to Rome Ethredge and Liz Jackson helping with tubing trip. This event was a huge success. With the agricultural industry being such a huge part of this area's economy, it is great to see young people take an interest in learning more information that may just help them in future job endeavors. The future of agriculture is in their hands.

Curriculum Corner

Student Tools for Emergency Planning

Inspire youth to be prepared with FEMA's Student Tools for Emergency Planning (STEP) Curriculum. The newly updated STEP is a modular emergency preparedness curriculum with fun activities that can be used in many different settings, inside and outside of school. Geared for students in fourth grade and above, the program guides students on how to create emergency kits and family communication plans. At the same time, it teaches students about disasters, from severe weather to wildfires to pandemics. STEP includes three core lessons that can each be taught in as little as 30 minutes. Educators can also incorporate five supplemental lessons on specific disasters — severe weather, earthquake, fire, flood, and pandemic emergencies. A series of YouTube videos for kids, called Disaster Dodgers, helps introduce each concept, and an activity book offers 18 activities to reinforce ideas and jumpstart creativity. Steps to Submitting:

- 1. Visit Georgia 4-H shared file folder Submitting Agent Resources and Tools for 4-H Programming and review all documents including timeline and submission requirements.
- 2. Be prepared to provide the information requested below when submitting to www.pubreview.ugaurbanag.com. These questions are designed to:
 - •Help you define the intended purpose of the resource
 - •Determine the type of resource you are submitting
- 3. Submit prior to the next quarterly board meeting. The dates are on georgia4h.org and will be published yearly. Proposals will be reviewed and clarifying information will be sought if necessary.
- 4. Write your manuscript and assembly any accompanying images.
- 5. Be sure to include a list of sources and/or image credits.
- 6. Refer to the style guide for Georgia 4-H to format your resource.
- 7. For references use APA style and list as much information as possible (author(s)), publication date, title of article, title of journal, volume, issue, page numbers, etc.). There is a citation chart example on the resource page. Refer to the APA style.
