

Hannah Dasher

Whether she's whipping up a recipe for her viral TikTok "Stand By Your Pan" series, or penning her next hit with some of Nashville's top songwriters, Hannah Dasher is not slowing down when it comes to getting where she's always planned to be.

Raised in Savannah, GA, Hannah would spend hours reading album covers front-to-back as a child, all while taking cues from a diverse lineup of influences like Alan Jackson, Hank Jr., Tom Petty, Eric Church, and Aretha Franklin. After graduating from the University of Georgia, Dasher moved into a small attic apartment just off Music Row in Nashville. To make ends meet, she began working five days a week selling fishing boats and outboard motors at Bass Pro Shops. She was later fired from Bass Pro for writing songs on the job. Soon after, she landed her first publishing deal, and as fate would have it, her first cut, Brad Paisley's "Go To Bed Early," was from an idea she'd been working on during her last days employed at Bass Pro.

Hannah continued to grab attention at writers' nights and local showcases such as Whiskey Jam (where people started comparing her to Jamey Johnson) and earning the nickname "Hannah Damn Dasher" from her fellow tunesmiths.

The hustle has clearly paid off for Dasher, who has rocked audiences across the country, opening for greats including her hero Bocephus, The Cadillac Three and Lynyrd Skynyrd. Now with her own music, Dasher solidifies that she is not to be overlooked, with traditional-cut artistry, bold lyrics, and can't-be-duplicated personality.



Laura Warren

Laura is an Emmy-nominated investigative journalist, evening news anchor, and a distinguished Mitchell County 4-H alumna. She graduated with honors from the University of Georgia in December 2011 with a degree in Broadcast News. She interned for News 12 during the summer of 2011, and her news director offered her a job before she even graduated. She started working for News 12 that November, reporting on the weekends before she graduated in December and became a full-time reporter. A little over a year later, she started co-anchoring the First at Five newscast. Two and a half years later, she began anchoring the evening news at 6:00 PM and 11:00 and contributing in-depth, investigative reports.

During her time as a reporter in Augusta she has covered breaking news from tornadoes, floods, ice storms, and plane crashes to investigative pieces into sex trafficking, fraud, coverups, and misuse of taxpayer funds by police and government agencies. She received an Emmy nomination for her

investigation into private security companies operating illegally without proper training or licensing at many of our largest local venues. That investigation led to local venue policy changes, a state investigation, and ongoing reform within the industry. She has been honored with numerous awards over her decade in journalism including recognition as the Best Anchor/Reporter by the Associated Press, the Best Personality by the Georgia Association of Broadcasters, and the Best Reporter, Writer, and Anchor by the National Association of Television Arts and Sciences.

She loves telling news stories, but her favorite stories are bedtime stories. She is mom to John Michael and Addison. Laura is also on the North Augusta Family Y Board of Directors. In her spare time, she loves cheering on the Dawgs, playing golf, traveling with her husband, and cooking.

On the Farm: Training 4-H Youth in Pest Management and Agribusiness Careers

Unfortunately, many Georgia families have no age-appropriate books available in their homes, and this problem is especially prevalent in low-income households. To combat the challenges Georgia's youth and parents are facing with literacy that have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, UGA Extension and the State Botanical Garden of Georgia joined forces to offer Extension R.E.A.D.S (Reaching and Empowering All Developing Scholars). This statewide initiative kicked off during the 2021 Read Across America Week with the goal of promoting youth literacy in an engaging and hands-on manner. Resources include books read aloud for various grade levels. Since the program began, the materials and resources earned a collective reach of over 8,500 contacts!


