Since 1974, the Georgia Association of Extension 4-H Youth Development Professionals has recognized the outstanding support and personal involvement in Georgia 4-H programming efforts with the Friend of 4-H Award. Given to an individual, group of people, or business/organization, this award signifies important contributions in helping to fulfill the Georgia 4-H vision and mission. This year's recipient is no stranger to 4-H and Extension.

This year, the GAE4HYDP Friend of Extension Award was presented to the University of Georgia Warnell School of Forestry and Natural Resources. The faculty and staff of Warnell have been instrumental in educating 4-H youth in the areas of conservation and environmental education for more than 30 years. Their specialists orchestrate our Forestry and Wildlife judging contests, facilitate trainings for adult leaders, host students for visits to campus labs, and co-administer the newly established 4-H Natural Resources Exploration Camp. Dr. Nick Fuhrman, Associate Dean for Outreach, accepted this award on behalf of Warnell during State Congress.

In a vibrant display of community spirit and environmental stewardship, Charlton County 4-H successfully secured the Satilla River Soil and Water Conservation Environmental Mini Grant for the spring of 2024. This funding enabled them to transform a vision into reality by creating a stunning pollinator garden at the local public library. With the support of the Community Clovers Club, the project flourished as 4-H members meticulously selected and planted four types of pollinator perennial plants, ensuring a thriving habitat for local wildlife. The garden, completed in May 2024, features two hand-crafted bird baths and intricately hand-painted flower pots, all designed by enthusiastic 4-H students. Additionally, the Community Clovers Club contributed a custom-built bench, adding both functionality and charm to the space. Together, Charlton County 4-H and the public library are committed to maintaining this picturesque garden, providing a year-round haven for pollinators and a delightful retreat for the community.

Workshops and activities may include Seining, Canoeing, Bikes and Ice Cream, a Dolphin Cruise, an Amazing Race Scavenger Hunt, Kayaking, a Sea Turtle Center visit, Summer Waves, and more – every year looks a little different!

UGA's J.W. Fanning Institute for Leadership Development, in partnership with Georgia 4-H, held the inaugural Youth LEAD Georgia Summit. During the summit, youth from approximately 110 high schools across 77 counties in Georgia developed their leadership skills through multiple breakout sessions and discussed issues in Georgia from their perspectives as potential future community and state leaders during meetings at the UGA Center for Continuing Education & Hotel. The students also had the opportunity to spend time on the UGA campus, dining in the dining halls and visiting the Ramsey Student Center. 4-H Agents were selected for this partnership due to their esteemed reputation for delivering positive youth development programs and their demonstrated commitment to service. They served as recruitment liaisons between the J.W. Fanning Institute and other 4-H professionals in their respective districts. While attending the summit, 4-H Agents also assisted with chaperoning and taught classes specific to leadership. growth, and professionalism.

The Youth LEAD Georgia Summit, which is part of the Youth LEAD Georgia program, is made possible by a \$1.5 million contribution from Chick-fil-A, Inc., and an additional charitable investment by The Same

House, an Atlanta-based nonprofit organization.

Rodney Bullard, CEO of The Same House, delivered the keynote address, sharing his experience as a leader and emphasizing the importance of leadership in communities.

Youth LEAD Georgia is designed to equip youth with the skills and knowledge necessary to be the future leaders of our state and to learn how to apply those skills in action, working together to tackle challenges

impacting Georgia's future vitality.

Student feedback highlights the meaningful and thought-provoking impact of the Youth LEAD Georgia Summit: "Make sure you understand and respect all sides of an issue, even if you disagree with them." "Community is very important, and to be a good leader, or even a decent one, you have to come from a place of understanding, faith, and hard work." "To change the world, all you have to do is change the things in front of you."

The goals of the Youth LEAD Georgia program and summit include supporting youth in developing and improving leadership skills, helping youth explore opportunities and develop skills for success after high school, enhancing awareness and understanding of community challenges and opportunities in Georgia, building relationships across the state for young leaders to use as future resources, and empowering youth to become more involved in community issues.

Grilling is frequently an under-utilized area of cooking education. As part of a trial run, Jackson County held a Grilling Day as a summer program for youth to learn about using charcoal grills and how to best cook on those surfaces. Following the success of Grilling Day, the Grilling Club was formed and began meeting in early August. The club meets weekly and challenges youth with a different dish each week. Youths are responsible for setting up their grills at the start of each meeting. Once the grills are set up and heated, the members come together to learn about their dish for the week. This includes preparing it best, checking for doneness, and how it could be served. Dishes prepared by the Grilling Club include hamburgers, beef and vegetable kebabs, chicken thighs, pizza, and dessert dishes. Each week is a new adventure in what can be accomplished on a charcoal grill.

The Grilling Club also serves as a segue for participants to practice and prepare for the Food Showcase Chicken BBQ and Turkey BBQ contests at Rock Eagle. With each meeting, students gained more confidence and knowledge about how to utilize the coals for direct or indirect heat, grill utensils, meat thermometers, and seasonings to create incredible dishes for the competition. Thanks to the learning environment created by the Grilling Club, more than half of the members took part in the Georgia 4–H BBQ contests at Rock Eagle on September 21st.









Bringing Back the Magic: Atkinson County 4-H Hosts Prom for Seniors

At the local extension office, filled with laughter and the tantalizing aroma of fresh ingredients, local youth gathered recently to embark on a transformative journey through the 4-H Science Chef program. This unique initiative, made possible by a generous grant from the Milliken Foundation. aims to blend the worlds of science and culinary arts, igniting a passion for learning and healthy living in participants in grades 5-8.

Over the course of two exhilarating days, the program unfolded in a series of six engaging science lessons followed by six hands-on cooking lessons. Participants explored the fascinating science behind the food they eat, gaining insights into nutrition, food chemistry, and the importance of sustainable practices.

From understanding the properties of different ingredients to experimenting with flavors and textures, the science lessons were designed to inspire curiosity and critical thinking. Participants learned about the nutritional value of various food groups, how to read labels, and the significance of making informed food choices.

The hands-on cooking lessons allowed participants to put their newfound knowledge into practice. Under the guidance of 4-H volunteers, Lori Squires and Camillia Ivey, they chopped, sautéed, and blended their way to delicious, healthy meals. Each lesson focused on creating dishes that were not only tasty but also packed with nutrients.

Beyond cooking and science, the program fostered a sense of community and teamwork. Participants collaborated in small groups, sharing ideas and encouraging one another as they tackled new recipes. The sense of accomplishment was palpable as they presented their finished dishes, eager to share with family and friends.

The success of the 4-H Science Chef program in Bacon County would not have been possible without the support of the Milliken Foundation. Their generous grant enabled the purchase of supplies. ingredients, and educational materials, ensuring that every participant could fully engage in this enriching experience.

As the program came to a close, participants left with more than just newfound skills and knowledge —they departed with a renewed enthusiasm for cooking and an appreciation for the science that makes it all possible. Many expressed interest in further exploring culinary arts, with aspirations of becoming chefs, nutritionists, or even food scientists.

The 4-H Science Chef program stands as a shining example of how community support and innovative education can inspire the next generation. With the continued backing of organizations like the Milliken Foundation, the future looks bright for young chefs ready to make their mark in the

Curriculum Corner

Physics, biology, and engineering "smash" together in this fun and educational experiment! The Egg Drop Challenge lesson plan engages students in hands-on learning about physics and engineering principles by tasking them with designing a protective structure for a raw egg, ensuring it survives a drop from a height. Students work in teams to brainstorm, plan, and build their contraptions using various materials, promoting creativity and problem-solving skills. After testing their designs, students analyze the results, discussing what worked, what didn't, and why. This activity not only reinforces concepts such as gravity, force, and impact but also fosters teamwork, critical thinking, and the but also fosters teamwork, critical thinking, and the engineering design process.



Edible Soil Lab

The Edible Soil Lab lesson plan invites students to explore the layers of soil and their components through a hands-on, culinary activity. Students create a layered dessert that visually represents soil horizons—topsoil, subsoil, and bedrock—using ingredients like crushed cookies, chocolate pudding, and gummy worms. This engaging approach allows them to learn about soil composition, texture, and the role of organic matter while satisfying their creativity and taste buds. After constructing their edible soil models, students reflect on the importance of soil in ecosystems and discuss how various layers support plant life and contribute to environmental health, reinforcing their understanding of earth science concepts.


Getting to Know You
