
Rivers Alive Libertarian Party Cleanup September 14, 2024



On September 14, a group of six volunteers of the Bartow Libertarian Party conducted a river cleanup from Euharlee Creek to Hardin Bridge. There were a total of 6 volunteers, working for a total of 4 hours*6 volunteers=24 volunteer hours. Zach Tyree, with Euharlee Creek Outfitters, gave the group a safety briefing before heading out on the 4 mile journey down the river. KBB supplied the trash pickers, t-shirts, waterproof phone holders, & mesh trash bags. The kayaks were rented from Euharlee Creek Outfitters.



The volunteers began at Euharlee Creek and ended at Hardin Bridge boat launch. The volunteers paddled in kayaks and retrieved trash from the sides of the river banks and shallow water areas. The 6 volunteers removed 4 bags of trash, 2 tires, multiple inflatable rafts, and multiple ropes out of the Etowah River (equal to 150 pounds). There was a tire and a few rafts that the volunteers could not safely get out of the river. The volunteers took note of the mile markers where the tire and rafts were and reported, once safely on land, to get removed. Bartow County Parks and Rec picked up the trash from the boat ramp.





Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup September 28, 2024







This year was the celebration of the 39th Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup. The cleanup was held on September 28, 2024. There was a total of 1,476 volunteers signed up to volunteer at GLAC, and 1,100 showed up. Volunteers completed 4,950 volunteer hours. There was a total of 2.27 tons of trash removed from the shorelines of Lake Allatoona. There was a total of 15 tires removed from the shorelines.

Keep Bartow Beautiful supplied the education piece for the Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup. In the goody bags, handed out before the cleanup, there was a print out with instructions for the education piece. They could scan the QR code which took them to a website and each person could choose from multiple activities. Once they completed one activity, they answered questions on the survey about the activity they chose, then gave feedback from the cleanup. 18 and under participants could complete the activity online to be entered to win a gift card or kayak. 1 kayak and 5 \$50 Visa gift cards were awarded by a drawing. This year we had 20 complete the activity to be entered in to win a prize.

The Lake Allatoona Warriors is a branch of the LAA and consists of volunteers who conduct year-round cleanup activities focusing on cleaning areas during the fall and winter lake drawdown and remote areas.

The LW had 195 volunteers from July 2024- June 2025. They completed 464 volunteer hours.

The volunteers removed 9,400 pounds of trash from around Lake Allatoona. They also removed 5 tires and 3 chairs from around Lake Allatoona.

Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup continues to inspire environmental stewardship

escribed as a "heartwarming sight," the Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup continues to inspire people of all ages to engage in environmental stewardship. This outreach has cleared the body of water and its shoreline of around 515 tons of trash over the past nearly four decades

"The 515 tons of trash equates to over 1,030,000 pounds of trash and debris removed since 1986," said Cartersville resident Carole Miller, a board member of GLAC's presenting organization - Lake Allatoona Association. "If over 1 million pounds of trash and debris had not been removed from Allatoona Lake's shoreline, would it be a place that you would enjoy visiting today? What about the water that it supplies to millions of people? This is what we ask people to think about as they spend time on and around the lake.

"It is our hope that by participating

in the cleanup, by walking the shoreline and boating to remote locations to collect trash, that people, young and less young, see the amount of trash that is left behind. We hope that this shocking revelation will impact their thinking and actions for the future.

This year's cleanup took place in the wake of Hurricane He-

shoreline when the lake level is lower. The shoreline was a muddy mess - trees and debris were everywhere. Some of the campsites were closed due to flooding.

Echoing Miller's comments, Katie Martin — executive director of Keep Bartow Beautiful — shared the "cleanup looked a little different" than past years.

"This event is always rain or shine," Martin said. "Due to the weather, we had a smaller turnout than years previous. The water level came up fast from the rain we had a few days before the cleanup.

"Due to the water level rise, a lot of the litter that was exposed before the rain was underwater by the time of the cleanup Saturday. This event is a one-day event to clean the shorelines of Lake Allatoona. I just want to say 'thank you' to everyone that came out for the cleanup. This event is always successful with how much litter is removed in a day.

Originally coordinated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Great Lake Allatoona Cleanup is currently overseen by the Lake Allatoona

Over the years, the cleanup has won numerous accolades, including the Take Pride in America Award from 1986 to 1989 and 1991, Certificate of Environmental Achievement awards from Renew America from 1996 to 1998, Public Lands Day Award in 1986, Keep America Beautiful award in 1995 and a first place Litter Prevention award from Keep Georgia Beautiful in 2019.

This year's event featured 37 cleanup sites.

"All three counties — Bartow, Cherokee and Cobb — had participation," Miller said. "Collection was by walking the shoreline, by volunteers being taken out by boat to parts of the shoreline that were not easily accessible from the shoreline and by several canoers and kayakers that collected trash in coves.

"We will not have the list of items picked up until next week however, I can assure you that we found hundreds of plastic bottles, aluminum cans, glass, fast food restaurant packaging of all sorts, fishing lines, clothing, batteries, rubber balls, cigarette butts and bottle caps, just to name some items commonly found. We also picked up a large number of tires that we will be discarding at no charge thanks to Keep Bartow Beautiful's Tire Amnesty program set for Sept. 28 to Oct. 5."

During the GLAC event, Martin took photos at two of the cleanup locations: Red Top Mountain State Park and Gatewood Park. She noted the volunteers at these sites picked up a wide range of discarded debris, including food containers, bottles, cans, clothes, shoes, rope and inflatables.

"One volunteer found a speaker and camping chairs," Martin said. "When cleaning up, you know you will collect the regular things, like bottles and cans. Each cleanup is different in what you will clean up, and it depends on the location."

Many of the items that were collected were related to camping or boating, she noted.

"At the Gatewood location, volunteers found toys close to the water that was left behind," Martin said. "When cleaning up, you are always looking for unusual items and wonder how they got there. I remember



my first year in the cleanup we found a bumper to a car."

Martin initially took part in the cleanup during her childhood.

"When I was in 4-H, I participated in the GLAC," she said. "I spent many summers on Lake Allatoona camping, swimming and fishing. Lake Allatoona is one of my favorite places in Bartow County. This event was eye opening by seeing how much litter I collected in just a few hours. Once we put all our trash together, that was even more eye opening."

Martin shared she still takes joy in being a part of this annual outreach.

"I have helped with the event since 2020, since starting with KBB," she said. "This one-day event takes months of planning.

"KBB provides the education piece for GLAC. KBB has provided education at the picnics and now provides the education virtually. KBB will be having a drawing on Oct. 18 for individuals who completed the survey."

She also encourages cleanup participants to peer into the yellow bag they received.

"There will be an orange paper from Keep Bartow Beautiful about how to be entered to win a kayak or a gift card," Martin said. "The deadline to be entered is Oct. 17."

Like Miller, Martin hopes the GLAC will impact the volunteers' day-to-day outlooks and habits.

"All litter and debris enters our waterways," Martin said. "I hope this event inspires them to participate in other cleanups and to





participate in GLAC yearly. I want everyone to think about all the trash that was removed in one day. Just think if we all collected trash that we saw throughout the year.

"All the trash we would remove would not end up in our waterways. Some tips to stop littering: have a bag in your vehicle for trash and throw it away at gas stations or homes, tarp your trash while transporting, educate others on how litter affects us, cover trash cans and recycling cans, volunteer for cleanups, report illegal dumping and more."

Since 2012, Miller said, GLAC has drawn more than 34,000 volunteers who have collected over 82 tons of litter and 1,450 tires from the lake's



shore. She shared this is "a seemingly monumental achievement until we start to find more trash again, and again."

Along with seeing trash removed from Lake Allatoona, Miller is delighted to see people of various ages working together at this event.

"Our volunteers range in age from 91 years old to 4 years old," she said. "Our oldest volunteer, Nony Brakeman, and her daughter Brenda Grano have been working the cleanup for all 39 years the event has existed.

"Watching this diverse group of people with one common goal is a heartwarming sight. I hope that it will encourage others to join us next year."

On Sep. 28 Keep Bartow Beautiful, Bartow Grant Writing Dep., & Bartow Solid Waste conducted a scrap tire amnesty week, which concluded on Oct. 5. An amnesty event is an effective way to remove and recycle scrap tires that blight our community and pose health hazards for residents. During this event, only Bartow residents were able to come recycle an unlimited amount of tires. Two semitrailers were contracted by Liberty Tire to load the tires onto. These tires were transported and processed at a recycling facility. The main landfill (40 Allatoona Dam Rd.) was the only drop-off location for this event. A total of 1,704 tires were collected, which consisted of car tires, truck tires, and tractor tires. This was 136 more collected than last year. Bartow county solid waste employees collected and loaded all tires for the week. This event was made possible by a STAR grant awarded from the Environmental Protection Division for \$7,992. Conducting this event hopefully encouraged community members to recycle their tires and not illegally dump them on the roadways and in waterways.

Scrap Tire Amnesty Week kicks off Sept. 28

Scrap Tire Amnesty Week is returning Sept. 28 to Oct. 5 to the Bartow County Main Landfill.

"This event is a great opportunity to remove and recycle scrap tires," Keep Bartow Beautiful Executive Director Katie Martin said. "Tires can be a blight to the community and pose health hazards."

Martin spoke about what the Scrap Tire Amnesty Week will entail.

"The week of the tire amnesty event citizens of Bartow County can drop off their unused tires for free," Martin said. "The event will start on Sept. 28 and end on Oct. 5.

"Individuals can take their tires to the main landfill at 40 Allatoona Dam Road, Cartersville. The staff at Bartow County Solid Waste will collect and load all tires for the week."

This event is funded by the STAR Grant that was awarded by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Bartow County Grant Writing Department Director Brielle Shinall provided more details about this funding.

"The director of the **Bartow County Solid** Waste Department, Rip Conner, in partnership with executive director of Keep Bartow Beautiful, Katie Martin, applied for Local Government Scrap Tire Abatement Reimbursement (STAR) grant funds to help residents of Bartow County clean up scrap tires in our community," Shinall said.

The county will be reimbursed up to \$7,992 to cover the cost of the event.

"I hope this event encourages the community to recycle their tires and not illegally dump them in our waterways and roadways," Martin said. "This is a free event. I encourage everyone to participate."

Martin discussed the success the event had last year.

"The one-week event was well-attended," she said. "There were a total of 1,568 tires collected. Three 52-foot semi-trailers were loaded full of tires for the Tire Amnesty Week last year. KBB staff had multiple calls every day leading up to the event."

Martin continued

to give reasons for participating in the event.

"This is a free event for Bartow County residents," she said. "Mosquitoes are attracted to tires because of the coloring and it provides shade for them to lay eggs.

"Standing water is the key to limiting mosquitos and most tires hold water. This is a great way to limit standing water on your property."

"This project will benefit the citizens of the county," Shinall said. "Bartow County anticipates receiving around 4,380 passenger tires during the amnesty event. Commissioner Steve Taylor approved this project because it was deemed in the best interest of the citizens of Bartow County that the Bartow County Solid Waste Department apply for STAR funding to collect scrap tires and select a carrier to deliver the tires to a beneficial reuse scrap tire processor for recycling.

"This project is also good for the environment because it will take tons of scrap tires to a processing/ recycling facility. This means that these scrap tires will not be left outside to collect water or dumped somewhere the tires are not wanted. The tires will be responsibly processed and will not be a nuisance to anvone."

Great American Cleanup Emerson October 12, 2024



Great American Cleanup October 12, 2024 Waterside

The City of Emerson held a Great American Cleanup event in the fall of 2024 (Saturday October 12, 2024). The cleanup had two main locations: Waterside Estates and Downtown Emerson (with registration at Emerson City Hall). It was foggy on the morning of the event. The cleanup began at 9:00 am and concluded at 11:00 am. The waterside site had 8 volunteers and the downtown group had 25 volunteers. A total of 33 volunteers for the fall cleanup date (volunteer hours 33 x 2= 66 total hours).

The waterside group collected 11 bags of litter and 1 tire, while the downtown group collected 80 bags, a vehicle fender, a large wire bundle, and a sign post. The weight from the downtown cleanup trash was 1,600 pounds. The weight from the waterside cleanup was 220 pounds, making it a combined total of 1,820 pounds. Even though Emerson had a smaller volunteer turnout than last year, total pounds of trash collected increased.


National Planting Day/Garden Workdays October-November 2024




America Recycles Day 2024-2025



Keep Bartow Beautiful delivered a total of fourteen Slim Jim 23 gallon recycling bins, three 32 gallon round recycling bins, and seventy-three desk side recycling bins to multiple schools (High school– Cass, Middle– Woodland, Adairsville, Red Top, Elementary– Allatoona, Clear Creek, & Cloverleaf). Each school received posters to display in their hallways and classrooms. The posters displayed what could be recycled. Recycling lessons were taught at several elementary schools by KBB staff (Katie Martin & Gracie Jordan). These schools included: Euharlee Aug. 26 (3rd grade 60 students), Emerson Sep. 11 (3rd grade 50 students), Pine Log Sep. 15 (2nd grade 60 students), & Kingston Feb. 6 (recycling club 20 students). A total of 221 recycling bins were delivered with new KBB stickers placed on all. Emerson Elementary Sep. 29 (3rd grade 50 students) took a tour of the Bartow County Recycling Center and Main Landfill.

Erosion lessons STEM Partner Resource

As a STEM partner KBB presented "Erosion Classes" to help meet standard:

S5E1. Obtain, evaluate, and communicate information to identify surface features on the Earth caused by constructive and/or destructive processes. a. Construct an argument supported by scientific evidence to identify surface features (examples could include deltas, sand dunes, mountains, volcanoes) as being caused by constructive and/or destructive processes (examples could include deposition, weathering, *erosion*, and impact of organisms).

KBB staff (Katie Martin & Gracie Jordan) employed several methods to talk about erosion. The Enviroscape was used for Elementary level classes to explain the effects of erosion on water quality. Different types of environments and pollutions (non-point and point) were introduced and then best management practices were discussed to help solve these pollution issues. The 2025 Chipper Project was conducted on Jan. 18, 2025. The event had to be rescheduled due to snow. Lake Allatoona is a flood controlled lake, meaning the water drops to normal river flow in the winter months. This winter we have had too much rain, which has made the lake rise. The location that

was selected was Proctor Landing Park. There were 11 Army Corp Rangers and 4 Army Corp volunteers that collected, transported, and predrilled 200 trees (totaling 100 hours of volunteer time).



There were around 300 live Christmas trees recycled at our collection sites around the county. There were more Christmas trees recycled this year than the year previous. Volunteers anchored 200 trees at Proctor Landing for fish habitats and 100 trees were mulched. For the workday 17 volunteers carried and anchored 200 trees to the established rail road ties in the lakebed. There were 6 DNR staff, 1 Army Corp Ranger, 2 KBB staff, 3 Marietta Bassmasters, and 5 KBB volunteers that completed an hour of volunteer time for a total of 17 volunteer hours for the workday.

Christmas tree recycling gets underway Dec. 25

eep Bartow Beautiful is encouraging the public to take part in the Bring One for the Chipper campaign. Starting this week, the local community will be able to deliver live, undecorated Christmas trees to collection sites managed by either the Bartow County government or U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"For 25 years, since 1991, Bring One for the Chipper, Georgia's annual Christmas tree recycling program, has collected and recycled over 6 million trees," according to www.bartowga.org/kbb. "Keep Bartow Beautiful began its program in 2000 and since that time has grown to support two distinct projects.

"The original intention in recycling 'live' Christmas Trees was a response to the 1991 Yard Trimmings Waste Disposal Act, which bans yard trimmings from lined landfills minimizing landfilled materials and extending the 'life' of these landfills. These trees were mulched for water conservation in landscaping and erosion control."

KBB Executive Director Katie Martin shared this effort expanded its reach in 2006, when KBB joined forces with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Georgia Department of Natural Resources and Marietta BassMasters. Through this fish habitat program, she said, "trees are anchored and eventually submerged" to create habitat for fish in the man-made Lake Allatoona.

Overall, local residents have recycled 23,250 live Christmas trees since KBB launched Bartow's Bring One for the Chipper initiative.

"Last year there were around 250

Christmas trees recycled in Bartow County," Martin said. "I would like to see 500 Christmas trees recycled this year. In the past few years, the numbers of trees recycled have went down. The number of live

Christmas trees since starting the program has been anywhere from 250 to 1,000 recycled in one year."

For the fish habitat project at Lake Allatoona, she said around 225 trees will be needed. Looking ahead to the January workday, Martin provided an overview of how the trees will be used and benefit Lake Allatoona.

"They will drill holes in the trunks of the trees before the fish habitat workday," Martin said. "They will also prepare the

site where the trees will be installed. To prepare the sites, they will remove the old trees and wire from the anchor points.

"At the workday, volunteers will use wire to attach the tree to the anchor point in the lakebed. In the following months, the lake will rise to normal lake levels for the summer and the trees will become submerged. Once the trees are submerged, it will provide shelter for smaller fish, and they will be able to hide from predators better. The trees will attract macroinvertebrates, which smaller fish feed on."

Except for Jan. 1, area residents will be able to drop off their trees from Dec. 26 to Feb. 1 to the Bartow County Solid Waste/Recycling Collection Centers — 40 Allatoona Dam Road, Cartersville; 1408 Burnt Hickory Road, Cartersville; 48 Industrial Drive, Cartersville; 15 Cedar Creek Road, Cartersville; 684 Center Road, Cartersville; 1214 Taylorsville Macedonia Road, Taylorsville; 212 Stamp Creek Road, White; 3285 Pine Log Road, Rydal; 4792 Joe Frank Harris Parkway, Adairsville; 638 Hall Station Road, Kingston; 281 Hardin Bridge Road, Cartersville; and 6507 Glade Road, Acworth.

Operating from Dec. 25 to Jan. 8, the Lake Allatoona collection sites will include Allatoona Operations Project Management Office, Victoria Day Use Area, Sweetwater Campground overflow parking area, Galt's Ferry Day Use Area, Payne Boat Ramp, Blockhouse 1 Fishing Jetty behind Paw Paw's Convenience Store and Bethany Bridge Fishing Jetty.

"There are seven sites that have been created to help the shoreline fishing: the area next to Cooper Branch II Day Use Area, Bethany Bridge Fishing Jetty, Blockhouse Ramp Fishing Jetty, Blockhouse 1 Fishing Jetty/behind the store, Dallas Landing Fishing Jetty/city of Acworth, Galt's Ferry Day Use Fishing Jetty and the Victoria Day Use Fishing Jetty," said Christopher Purvis, lead ranger over volunteers, partnerships and public awareness for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Allatoona Lake. "We're hoping to replenish Bethany Bridge this year and possibly the small fishing area at Cooper Branch. Since this program began in 2006. there has been a steady improvement of fishing and an increase of visitors fishing in those areas."



Nature's HVAC

According to Georgia Power, well-placed shade trees can reduce air-conditioning needs by up to 30 percent. Deciduous trees can be extra helpful; when they lose leaves in winter, the increased sunlight on your home slashes heating costs. Planted near parking lots and public spaces, trees reduce smog-producing "heat islands."

Branches

Habitat

Of the many creatures in our urban ecosystem, your best friend is the backyard bird. Red-tailed hawks and Eastern screech owls control rats and mice, while little chickadees eat about 1,000 flying insects a day.

Roots


Flood Warning

One hundred mature trees catch about 139,000 gallons of rainwater per year. As natural landscapes are replaced by pavement and buildings—which can't absorb rainfall—more water rushes to streams, carrying pollutants such as motor oil and pesticides. In urban areas with 75 to 100 percent impervious cover, more than half of dirty stormwater runoff reaches streams; in areas with natural ground cover, only a 10th does. In addition to keeping streams clean, trees reduce street flooding.

Leaves

Air filters

During photosynthesis, trees remove smog-causing air pollutants; 100 trees eliminate roughly 53 tons of carbon dioxide from the air per year. By the time it's 10, a tree can absorb 48 pounds per year.

Great American Cleanup 🚄 Georgia Power Citizens of GA Power-June 12, 2025







World Environment Day-AB


June 6, 2025




Spring Demo Garden Workdays

2024-2025 School Recycling Contest

In the 2024-2025 school year there was a total of **167,590 pounds** of recyclable materials recycled at the county and city schools. The full time enrollment numbers for both county and city schools was equal to 18,249. The average amount of recycled material pounds per students reached a little over 9 pounds per student county wide, over both county and city school systems. The recycling poundage is down compared to last year. The baler at the recycling center was down for a few months and we had 4 Elementary Schools not participate in the contest this year.



In the elementary division, Allatoona Elementary placed 1st with 11,720 lbs. (27.9 lbs. per student), Euharlee placed 2nd with 14,520 lbs. (25.2 lbs. per student), and Pine Log placed 3rd with 8,040 lbs. (17.5 lbs. per student).





2024-2025 School Recycling Contest

Red Top Middle School placed 1st in the contest with recycling 10,360 pounds, which is equivalent to 15.53 pounds per student. The Middle/High School division was a tight race this year. Woodland Middle School placed 2nd in the contest with recycling 12,890 pounds, which is equivalent to 18.52 pounds per student. Adairsville Middle School placed 3rd in the Middle/High School division. Adairsville students collected 15,420 pounds in total, to be equivalent to 18.10 pounds per student. All the county and city middle/high

schools participated this year in

the contest!


